

Old Wavendon, Eagle Farm South & Glebe Farm in Wavendon

- 5G Coverage in our local area the Parish Council receive many enquiries from residents concerned about coverage in our local patch. Seems that Vodafone may be the most advanced with their 5G deployment. The Parish is working with the local MP (Iain Stewart) to lobby for the speediest possible roll out.
- **Arriva Bus Services** Following a long campaign to persuade Arriva to start (or redirect) a scheduled (timetabled) bus service through Eagle Farm South and Glebe Farm via Burney Drive, Dankworth Way and Elmswell Road and linking on to Groveway, Arriva has confirmed such a rerouted Service (3 or 3A) will commence early in 2024 as soon as Burney Drive fully opens. The Parish Council will keep you updated.
- Sander Crescent & Chantry House Drive The new residents of Sander Crescent (Glebe Farm) have been surprised to learn that they do indeed live in Wavendon Gate (Walton) rather than Wavendon parish in which the rest of Glebe Farm resides. An early parish boundary review has been requested!
- New Polling Station for 2024 onwards Following successful lobbying I am pleased to report that MK City Council has agreed to a second polling station for all forthcoming elections. This will be located at Glebe Farm School, far more convenient for Eagle Farm South and Glebe Farm residents. The two polling districts are planned to be known as Wavendon Farms and Old Wavendon.
- Car Cruising Milton Keynes City Council introduced a Public Space Protection Order in 2020 following a public consultation in which over 1,000 residents said they'd been negatively affected by vehicle related anti-social behaviour. This relates to powers under the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014. This means that drivers caught taking part in anti-social car cruising behaviours in MK, which includes excessive noise and driving at dangerous speeds, can be issued with a fine.
- The Parish Council has worked with the Police and Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley, Matthew Barber who has taken a particular interest in championing solutions on this matter and welcomes

- Establishing Neighbourhood Watch Groups -Concerns expressed to the Parish Council concern car security and the theft of Catalytic Converters, teenagers allegedly kicking in doors, the need for 20 MPH areas across the newer parts of the Parish and aggressive dogs loose in the estates. The Parish meets frequently with our local Thames Valley Police officers to discuss these and other issues and our local Community Officer PC Robin Childs robin. childs@thamesvalley.police.uk is happy to take further enquiries from local residents directly.
- The Parish Council has received many enquiries regarding how to set about joining or forming a local Neighbourhood Watch team. The contact of our (Wavendon Area) local coordinator or alternatively go to: enquiries@mknhwa.org.uk

- No easy access to NHS dentists for adults and **children** – a national problem. Campaign with local MP Iain Stewart to campaign for a local solution for our area. - Anti-social behaviour in the public play spaces, parents tell us that feel their children are being exposed to foul language and poor behaviour from teenagers etc. Teenagers have nowhere else to go as there isn't a youth centre.- our local Police Constable and PCSO's are being vigilant and have upped patrols and the Parish Council and local schools are seeking qualified youth workers to establish and manage a suitable youth facility.

- South East MK and the H10 Extension into Church Farm - The Parish Council has now managed to speak to the Parks Trust about their proposals which they say are intended to 'create our 2m property boundary clearance and remove all trees within 10 m of structures with foundations'. Their proposals were designed to coordinate with the landscaping scheme associated with the Connolly access road and therefore MK City Council will need to sit down with them and review these in the light of its H10 scheme. As you may know the Parks Trust have deferred implementation until the late autumn so MKCC will meet with them at that time to review the plans collectively. MK City Council does not as yet have a detailed acoustic report. The City Council is looking at bunding and natural screening as its first phase but if there is going to be a requirement for acoustic fencing then it will introduce that into the scheme. If there is a requirement the City Council would be looking to make this as inobtrusive as possible whilst still being effective. On the matter of the extension of the H10, MKCC will not be considering going beyond the O&H landholding within the currently allocated SEMK area. Its proposal is only for a 40mph single carriageway. Any further connection to Newport Road in Wavendon, should that ever be considered desirable, will not be by means of grid road but more of a local road connection with a maximum design speed of 30mph. There are no plans beyond this. As you may be aware, MK City Council is in the early stages of the new City Plan process and all kinds of options will no doubt be considered through the various stages in its evolution but those will be subject to full scrutiny and assessment and the fact that something may be proposed does not mean it will be found acceptable. As of today, however there are no plans at all eastward beyond SEMK.
- **Cost of living**, very much a national issue. Locally the food banks have been helping to support families but there are often anonymous posts from people that need financial help with food or hygiene products. - Schools and Health Centre in SEMK The schools will be made available at the appropriate time through a 'competition' run by MKCC but eventually adjudicated on by the Regional Schools Commissioner (I think they may now be called Regional Directors). The competition would identify the best 'organisation' (normally an Academy Trust) to run the school unless an existing schools

- 'transfers'.. Once the school is constructed it would be transferred by way of Lease to the organisation appointed by the RSC for a period of 125 years. MKCC would be the Landlord and therefore there would be a degree of local control over the land and property, but even should an Academy Trust fail it would be for the RSC to appoint their successor.
- Although Health provision in the new SEMK area is probably the single biggest issue people raise it is probably the hardest to give a precise answer on at this stage. A primary developer or land promoter (like L&Q or O&H) would normally bring a secondary or 'specialist' developer to provide the retail elements of the Local Centre and this could potentially include the future health facility. This would depend to a large extent on how the NHS (ICB) wants to, or can afford to, deliver the new facilities. If they have the capacity to provide revenue support for health requirement, but lack capital resource, they may wish the developer to provide the facilities and then be prepared to take a long lease on the finished product. This is known as Third Party Development (3PD) and is a model that has been used extensively in the last 15 years. We may still be a while away from knowing exactly how health will work but probably the least likely route, based on recent experience, is that the NHS takes control and delivers themselves, but circumstances may change. As for a community hall or any sports facilities, whether provided jointly or as separate elements, it is likely, even if MKCC took responsibility for delivery, that we would look for a more local body, Town or Parish Council ideally, to take these over from MKCC. In fact, it is now normal for MKCC to require to have an agreement along these lines in place before it can get permission within the council process to construct but assuming that can happen, MKCC would normally take the land and construct itself before Transfer, usually now on a Freehold basis, to the end user/ operator.
- The Open University The local Open University at Walton Hall is considering a multi-million pound move to a site close to the railway station in MK city centre. The plan would include a new 'sister' university to offer face-to-face courses for students to study in person.

The University's governing council has agreed to initiate work on the strategic and financial case to relocate the OU's existing campus at Walton Hall.



- East West Rail Government has announced its plans for the route from Bletchley to Bedford and on to Cambridge confirming a preferred route alignment between Bedford and Cambridge. These include:
- Keeping open the level crossings at Bow Brickhill and Woburn Sands
- **Retaining Woburn Sands station in its present** location (*subject to more consultation!)
- The launch of a 'need to sell' property support scheme to help affected homeowners
- Maximum of two freight services per day
- Reduction of maximum speed of trains from 100mph to 60-70 mph

- No additional bridges etc between Bow Brickhill and Woburn Sands and the removal of the threatened Woburn Sands bypass
 - However, it does seem that these 'proposals' frequently change so uncertainty remains about the whole project and what might be involved locally.

But if it says in progress that means that the new contractor Suez know about it already and are planning to return asap, so there is no need to submit a report or call MKCC.

From the Police and Crime Commissioner

Shoplifting has been much in the news of late and I am pleased to say that we have just signed off on a new tool to make it easier for shop staff to report crime and share intelligence with the police.


The Disc app is already used in several parts of Thames Valley as a platform for retailers to share reports of shoplifting and antisocial behaviour with each other.

It will not be properly integrated into the work that Thames Valley Police do, with neighbourhood officers being able to see local intelligence and crime reports going straight into the control room. It is all part of the work to improve the response to retail crime with faster action for urgent incidents and increased the number of charges, particularly focusing on persistent offenders.

Sometimes the national and international elements of policing can also have a local impact. The Regional Organised Crime Unit, hosted by Thames Valley Police has recently been able to recover nearly £2m worth of stolen cryptocurrency for a criminal jailed in the Netherlands and return it to victims across the globe, including some here locally.

In more "traditional" crimes our Rural Crime Taskforce continues to grow with some new Special Constables joining the team. Lead by the excellent Inspector Hutchings, who recently won a national NFU award as "Best Rural Crime Enforcer", the taskforce has now recovered more than £3m worth of stolen equipment and are working to make Thames Valley a hostile environment for those committing rural crime.



COMMUNITY ACTION: MK

Wavendon Parish Council and Community Action: MK are working closely dealing with the priority issues raised by residents in the Eagle Farm South and Glebe Farm parts of the parish.

Following conversations held with numerous residents the main areas of concern thus far have been:

- 1. Lack of amenities such as a shop or cafe
- 2. Public transport not available residents having to spend significant amounts on taxi transport to do a supermarket shop contributing to financial pressures.
- 3. Flooding in underpasses improved but seems to reoccur every time it rains.
- **4.** Drug use in underpasses (residents have to walk to Tescos in Kingston this way and feel unsafe when doing so and following the recent serious incident, residents have become cautious in using these routes.)
- **5.** Dangerous road to cross to the BP garage (closest shop)
- 6. Lack of school places for local children. (Glebe Farm school in particularly)

These issues have been raised by numerous people across both estates and residents can be assured that the Parish Council is addressing each in cooperation with MK City Council, The IFtL schools Multi Academy Trust, Thames Valley Police and Arriva buses.

I am thrilled Bletchley Park was able to host the successful AI Safety Summit on 1 & 2 November. It is fitting the birthplace of modern computing being the venue for conversations about the future use of artificial intelligence. It was a privilege to have been able to welcome the Prime Minister and the Secretary of State for Science, Innovation and Technology to Bletchley Park ahead of their meetings with world leaders and tech CEOs. The outcome, the Bletchley Declaration, is a landmark statement which has been signed by multiple countries including the United States of America and China to understand the risks of AI.

Milton Keynes Education Awards


As we entered the new academic year we were overwhelmed when we found out the Glebe Farm School parents and community had nominated us for the Milton Keynes Educational Awards.

Marston Vale Line News

Resumption of Marston Vale Line Services

Train services will resume on Monday 20th November 2023.

Initially four services will run in each direction on Monday – Fridays during the . morning and afternoon peak periods. A full rail replacement bus service (all stations and limited stop) will continue to operate at other times.

Please visit https://www.marstonvalecommunityrail. org.uk/resumption-of-train-services-2 to download the timetable. Alternatively copies are available from Bletchley Station, local libraries and Ridgmont Station Heritage Centre or contact Stephen for a copy to be sent to you.

The full timetable, including the return of a Saturday & Bank Holiday service, is expected to resume in early 2024 once sufficient train crew have completed their training on the Class 150s.

All of the three units allocated to the Marston Vale Line have recently been refurbished with features including an accessible toilet & baby changing facility, visual and audio announcements, CCTV and USB charging points throughout. Each train also has dedicated space for wheelchairs, pushchairs and cycles.

Please purchase tickets for Rail Replacement Bus journeys from any staffed station or the Ticket Vending Machine (TVM)) at unstaffed stations before travel. Tickets purchased online can be collected at any TVM. The TVMs are card only.

Please note the bus drivers are unable to issue rail tickets.

Rail tickets can be purchased from the conductor on the train by cash or card.

Groups of 3 - 9 adults travel for a third off with GroupSave.

Refunds for delayed journeys of 15 minutes or more can be claimed from the London Northwestern Railway Delay Repay Scheme - https://www. londonnorthwesternrailway.co.uk/about-us/delay-repay.

Consultation on Proposed Closure of Ticket Offices

It was announced on 31st October that plans to close rail ticket offices have been withdrawn by Trian Operating Companies following Transport Focus and London TravelWatch objecting to all of the current proposals.

The Secretary of State for Transport announced the outcome of the consultation, and that the Government has asked Train Operating Companies to withdraw their proposals.

Transport Focus and London TravelWatch received 750,000 responses from individuals and organisations to the public consultation. Those responses contained powerful and passionate concerns about the potential changes at stations.

Marston Vale CRP submitted a detailed response to the consultation strongly objecting to the proposed closure of the Ticket Offices at Bletchley, Leighton Buzzard and Wolverton stations.

Many thanks to all who responded.

Wavendon Park.

A Green Vision for The Future

The original architects of Milton Keynes envisaged it as a 'green city' blending urban developments with parks and open space to create a healthy and attractive environment.

There are many examples of this in practice, Campbell Park, The Ouzel Valley Park and Caldecotte Lake to name a few. But as the Southeast of Milton Keynes begins to expand around us it is becoming increasingly clear that this vision of a green environment is not extending to the new developments. Brooklands to the North of the A421 and Glebe Farm to the South contain very little land set aside for recreation whilst plans for the proposed Southeast Extension between Wavendon and Woburn Sands show only narrow strips of green bordering the brook or existing rights of way.

Yet here in Wavendon we are close to a large but little known area of open space - the old golf course which provides an ideal opportunity to create a new country park for our community. As MK Council is currently developing a new local plan for the area which includes the former golf course, Wavendon Voice (a local residents association) is putting together a case to present to the council to create a new park. We are keen to invite as many people as possible to register their interest so that we can lobby the council when the local plan is announced.

Below is a short extract from a briefing document prepared by Wavendon Voice with a link at the end to register your support.

What is Wavendon Park?

Wavendon Park is the name of a proposed new leisure area lying to the East of Wavendon Village. It is the site of the old Wavendon golf club which closed in October 2018. It is bordered on the West by Newport Road, on the North by Lower End Road and on the NE / SW axis by Cranfield Road. It consists of a large area (75 hectares) of open grassland and mature trees which are currently protected by TPO's. An old carriageway runs from The Newport Road to Wavendon House. The House and immediate grounds are grade 2 listed

History of the site.

The site was formerly the park attached to Wavendon Manor which was built in the 1760's. In 1798 the estate was bought by Henry Hoare, an eminent London banker, influenced no doubt by its elevated position on the Greensand Ridge and its proximity to London and the social life of nearby Woburn Abbey. In 1815 Wavendon House (then called Wavendon Hall) stood in the center of extensive grounds which were laid out in 1768-72 by Richard Woods (a contemporary of Capability Brown).

The house served as an outpost of Bletchley Park during WWII and a residential special school in the 1950s. In the 1980's the house and service buildings were divided into flats which are now privately owned. The park was converted into a golf course in 1989.

Why do we need Wavendon Park?

Milton Keynes Council states in its document MK50 which sets out aspirational targets for the future:

Our city is a special place. Everywhere, rich, peaceful landscapes surround our homes. As we continue to grow, we want to protect those things that are so important to the city's character. Our network of open spaces, parks, woodlands, lakes, canals and rivers, linked by paths and redways, provide beautiful accessible places for people to exercise and spend time.

Plan MK which is the current template for development until 2031 is more specific about the ratio of green space to urban development.

We have an ambition to be the greenest city and our aim is that around 40% of the city will continue to be green and blue space. The principle of early planning and delivery of green and blue infrastructure is central to our approach.

But recent developments in Milton Keynes appear to lack this same commitment to green space, with higher housing density and less land set aside for parkland. This is especially so to the Southeast of Milton Keynes where developments such as Broughton and Brooklands and the new sites to the South of the A421 contain distinctly less than a 60/40 split of urban to green / blue. New planned developments at Church Farm in Wavendon and the extensive MKSE expansion also do not meet this 60/40 aspiration.

Why this site is particularly suited to a new park?

- 1. The old golf course provides a unique area of open space within which to create a new park - with features such as mature trees, lakes, a canal, and an old carriage drive.
- 2. The land has been used for leisure purposes for over thirty years and is identified in Plan MK as designated for recreation.
- 3. Wavendon Park will provide much needed open space for the new developments south of the A421 and help to integrate these new communities with the established neighbourhoods around Wavendon and Woburn Sands.
- 4. The Park will provide the opportunity to create safe and environmentally friendly redways linking different parts of the Parish
- 5. The Park will connect with a proposed East West leisure route running from Caldecotte Lake through Browns Wood and Church Farm to the woodlands in the Vale of Marston – establishing an important green corridor through the City.

Next Steps

Wavendon Voice would like to see the concept of Wavendon Park incorporated within the local plan that we understand is being prepared and the land designated as a new linear park to prevent speculative development plans coming forward. We would then like to see an early start date announced for the preparation of the site so that residents can begin to enjoy the enormous benefits that this new park will bestow.

MK TECH FUND

Up to £7k for tech start ups

Milton Keynes City council creates new **MK Tech Fund for start-ups**

Milton Keynes City Council is funding a new scheme through The Milton Keynes Investors Group to provide five start-ups with up to £7,000 each to develop their business.

The MK Tech Fund is for tech businesses based in Milton Keynes who have fewer than ten employees and who have been trading for less than three years. By 'tech' the city council means the business is either developing new technology or using existing technology in an innovative way.

Milton Keynes has one of the highest levels of start-ups in the UK and the city council wants to ensure that tech talent stays within the city, creating new jobs and opportunities as businesses grow.

Founders are encouraged to apply for a grant – which doesn't need to be repaid - if they need a modest cash injection to get them to the next level or to get a specific project off the ground, perhaps to investigate a patent, or cover legal or marketing costs. One of the five firms will then be offered an additional £5,000 next year following a 'dragon's den' style pitch. The funding comes from the city council's £3.5m Economic Recovery Plan, which it has used to support hundreds of businesses and local employees and entrepreneurs following the pandemic.

The scheme, which opens for applications from 10 November, is managed by The Milton Keynes Investors Group (MKIG), which is the largest not-for-profit angel network in the UK. MKIG provide a free pitching platform for founders, with no success fees, and are frequently approached by MKbased micro businesses for this kind of funding.


Grassroots football in our Community

One of the most frequent complaints from Wavendon residents to the Parish Council concerns the level of speeding by motorists throughout the village.

To help address this, and to provide real data to Milton Keynes Council which we hope will help justify future road calming measures, a group of volunteers are now conducting Community Speedwatch operations. If you've not heard of it yet, Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a national initiative, primarily intended to raise awareness, where members of local communities work with the support and supervision of their local police to record details of speeding vehicles using approved detection devices.

Registered keepers of vehicles recorded speeding are contacted, initially with a letter, by Thames Valley Police explaining the potential risks and consequences of their behaviour. Repeat offenders may be subject to more stringent measures. The thing to note is that Speedwatch activity is not about interfering with neighbours' behaviour; it is a proactive solution to improve the safety and quality of life for everyone in the local community.

Our local group was set up in June with the active support of the Wavendon Parish Council who kindly funded the necessary equipment, including a speed gun, warning signs and high-viz vests. We have conducted well over 30 hours of CSW surveys across 9 currently approved sites within Wavendon.

Initially we have been concentrating on Walton Road and Newport Road, but we have approved sites on Burney Drive in both Eagle and Glebe Farms and expect to be increasing our operations there once the road opens to through traffic. Unfortunately, we cannot operate on Lower End Road as the existing speed limit is above the maximum permitted which is 40mph. To date we have reported over 250 speeding motorists to Thames Valley Police, including some travelling at over double the speed limit along Walton Road despite the advanced warning signs.

The good news is that while we've been operating we have seen compliance improve. Back in June we were regularly reporting 10% or more of motorists travelling at a speed high enough to trigger a warning letter, but that figure has now dropped to well below 5%.

We currently have 11 volunteers, but the group would always welcome more assistance, particularly from the Eagle and Glebe Farm areas or from any residents along Newport Road concerned about speeding there. If you'd like to volunteer, to know more or have any new survey sites which you'd like to suggest then please contact Cllr Steve Thomas at steve.thomas@ wavendonparishcouncil. There are strict rules on sites before they will be approved by the Police so it may not be possible to register one exactly where you suggest, but Steve will be able to provide advice and will be happy to submit applications for any new sites which are likely to be approved.

Murray listened attentively to the many representations made regarding traffic management and road safety issues on Newport Road and Walton Road and undertook to return to Wavendon to host a workshop (which may the first of two or more) to consider suitable MKC funded interventions that might address the issues raised.

This first such residents workshop took place on Thursday 23rd November.

The event ran over two hours with one hour being focused on Walton Road and the second on Newport Road issues. However, both proved to be closely interrelated in many respects. All residents are very welcome to attend the planned follow up sessions, to put forward their concerns and ideas as to how best these concerns might be addressed.

MKCC is pledging £5.5m in cost-of-living help

This winter MKCC is committing £5.5m to help residents facing food and energy insecurity, investing in preventative help that will also relieve some of the growing cost-of-living pressure on struggling health and care services such as social care, schools, and the NHS.

Last year, MK City Council declared a 'cost-of-living emergency' and spent £3.3m from its own funds and from government grants to support projects that provided food, reduced energy bills, and gave other help.

This year that support has been extended to a £5.5m 2023/24 Winter Plan, which includes:

- Help for children and families. Families of children who are entitled to free school meals will be given £15 of supermarket credit per child for each week of the two-week Christmas holiday and one-week February half term. A children's activity programme will return between 2 and 5 January, with food served at each session.
- Funding charities to help their work go further. Providing a financial boost to food charities such as MK Food Bank, and to organisations who give residents financial/debt advice, such as Citizens Advice MK, so they can reach more people.
- Helping people who are falling into rent arrears financial help and guidance for council tenants and for private renters who are struggling to make end meet.
- Funding warm spaces. MK's Parish and Town Councils will be given money to help them run informal activities, from community cafes to social clubs.
- Reducing energy and housing costs A 'Warmth and Wellbeing Helpline' continues, offering advice to residents on how to get support with energy costs.


