# From the Chairman of the Parish Council

Annual Report for 2020/21

What a year it has been. I must start by paying tribute to the residents who have done so much to help our community through the Covid 19 crisis offering practical help and support to neighbours be it though the Food Bank, collecting and delivering prescriptions to those isolating or simply being at the end of the phone for those who need support and reassurance. I suspect we all know friends and neighbours who have not made it through this terrible pandemic and my thoughts and prayers go out every day to relatives and friends who have lost their lives.



Can I also pay tribute to our fantastic staff at the **Asplands Heath Centre** and to our hard working and always cheery **High Street chemist** in Woburn Sands and his team for their helpful, timely and dependable support to our community. I was delighted to have been able to escort the Mayor of Milton Keynes on his visit to a number of high street premises during 2020 to add his thanks for their service to the community.

### THE NO EXPRESSWAY GROUP

On a positive note, many thanks and congratulations to the **success enjoyed by the No Expressway Group** (whose dynamic leadership was made up from Wavendon and Woburn Sands residents)



in convincing the government to first pause and then drop entirely its plans for a motorway style route from J13 and through the very heart of our communities that would have caused enormous environmental and social destruction. We must be wary however of those who advocate an Expressway by Stealth in the form of a Grid Road extension of the H10 all the way to junction 13. Let us be clear, a Grid Road is defined by MK Council as a reserved 80 metre wide corridor and I am certain you can imagine the destruction and blight that would cause to those living on or closest to such a high speed route. Remember as well, that Newport Road was downgraded by MK Council from a trunk road (formally the A5130) to simply the Newport Road to reflect its design and capacity limitations, so I am sure you can visualise the idea of it linking a grid connection into the heavily residential Newport Road, a route already stretched to and frequently beyond its built capacity.

### DEMAND RESPONSIVE TRANSPORT

(DRT - MK Connect)

Milton Keynes Council replaced scheduled bus services in April with what it describes as a Demand Responsive Transport solution which it now calls MK Connect. Let us be quite clear, it is financial pressures that have



led to this alternative transport solution following the loss of the many millions of pounds of parking revenues the council would have achieved in Central MK in particular but which have been lost in the current pandemic led crisis. MK Connect works like a minibus that meets you wherever you are, allowing you to travel whenever you want. The service has not been without its teething challenges but, until there is a change of heart or policy at MK Council back to subsidising public transport routes, we must do all we can to make DRT work as effectively and efficiently as possible.

### THE PROPOSED EXPANSION OF MK THROUGH THE SOUTH EAST MILTON KEYNES (SEMK) - STRATEGIC URBAN EXPANSION.

A considerable amount of information has been circulated by the Parish Council through its magazine, Wafas & Wallas and through the Hogsty End Handbook outlining the Milton Keynes Councils proposals for the development of up to 3000 dwellings in line with the local Plan (PlanMK). The local Plan (a requirement of central government) was adopted by MK Council in March 2019 and the area (SEMK) - an area of around 198 hectares - was included. The proposal specified amongst other matters, that the development "should incorporate buffer areas ... within the site to avoid coalescence with Wavendon, Woburn Sands and Bow Brickhill and that it should 'respect and reinforce the distinct character of those communities'. Approximately half the SEMK area lies within the parish of Woburn Sands the remainder being in Bow Brickhill and Wavendon parishes.

An initial proposal for a Gypsy and Traveller site close to 'the Groves' and in the eastern buffer zone in Woburn Sands was quickly removed following effective lobbying but a site close to the recreation ground in the centre of Wavendon remains in the proposals.

Milton Keynes Council is required to produce a Development Framework for SEMK which will become a Supplementary Planning Documents – SPD - (or local masterplan if you prefer) when adopted. This document will govern the development of the area and will have to be adhered to by developers of the site. New schools, leisure facilities, medical facilities and proposals for the site infrastructure are all set out in the draft SPD.

The SEMK development is of vital importance to the future of Wavendon; we must not allow the vibrancy and community spirit of the Parish to be destroyed by SEMK; we must find a way of working in harmony with SEMK to the benefit of both Milton Keynes and Wavendon/Woburn Sands.

The process of moving towards the Adoption of the SPD (Masterplan for SEMK) by MK Council will progress through the remainder of 2021. Much more at https://www.milton-keynes.gov.uk/planningand-building/planning-policy/south-east-miltonkeynes-strategic-urban-extension

### East West Rail - EWR



If SEMK were not enough, we have also been presented with a series of proposals by East West Rail in connection with its latest plans to operate train services from Oxford to Cambridge by 'the end of the decade.' The most significant proposal with potentially the greatest impact on our communities would be the suggestion that EWR would close the Newport Road/Station Road level crossing replacing it with a new route running from a point off Newport Road (close to the Wavendon Arms in Wavendon), crossing the railway at Woodley's Farm and linking into Bow Brickhill Road and beyond to Hardwick Road via the allotments and Edgewick Farm! It does seem that at first glance EWR has concocted a series of proposals that greatly favour the yet unbuilt SEMK and are to the detriment of those living in both Woburn Sands and Wavendon. It is also very apparent that there has been virtually no coordination nor consultation between MK Council and EWR in advance of both sets of consultations going public.

### TRAFFIC& SPEEDING -20 MPH ZONES

With the help of neighbourhood petitions and in line with residents wishes, the Parish Council has been following up a whole range of speed reduction



and traffic management initiatives across the Parish. The Covid restrictions have meant many have been delayed but we will chase MK Council Highways team to implement agreed schemes as quickly as possible. Residents in the Glebe Farm and Eagle Farm South parts of the Parish have asked that a number of 20 MPH zones across the newer parts of Wavendon be considered.



# LOOKING AHEAD TO 2022

On a more positive note we can look forward to the opening of the **new sports and community pavilion** off Stockwell Lane and Newport Road in the summer of 2022

and the Parish Council will pursuing a new, updated Parish Priorities Plan for the coming years setting out the ways in which can add to and enhance the environment in which live. At MK Council I have been chairing a committee that looked at just how Milton Keynes can deliver on its **Climate Change Emergency responses** and I am working with residents groups in each of the communities in the Danesborough & Walton Ward (including Wavendon and Woburn Sands) examining practical ways in which we can make a difference locally.

A **new community nursery** opens in September 2021 at St Marys CoE Wavendon Primary School and we hope to be in a position to adopt new allotments and new paly areas during the coming twelve months.

We shall finally be able to open our new extended community facilities on Walton Road, including our well stocked community Library and hopefully events such as the Annual Mrs Robinsons Outing will be able to proceed later in the summer.

We will of course also know more about the SEMK and East West Rail proposals – many battles ahead there I suspect and with the lifting of Covid restrictions residents and councillors will be able to hold the council to account in person rather than relying upon the unacceptable virtual meetings that we have had to ensure for the past 14 months.

### OUR SUPERB COUNCIL TEAM AND CLERK

Can I pay tribute to our superb, hard-working and dedicated Parish Clerk, Alan Kemp for his tireless efforts on behalf of us all. In addition, I would like to



pay my personal thanks to the Vice Chairman of the Parish Council, Robert Hill for 'stepping in' where required and for his dedication to all things sport and community centre. Likewise, to the other members of the Parish Council who give of their time to serve us all – and to those Parish Councillors who have retired over the course of the past twelve months.

If you would like to access the full range of benefits associated with becoming a registered patient, please pick up a Welcome Pack at reception or download a registration form from the above **"Registering Online"** tab. We take new registrations from 12 to 6pm every day of the week including Saturday and Sunday.

The GP Led Health Centre is open 08:00 until 20:00, 7 days a week, every day of the year including Bank Holidays.

### PREREGISTRATION

If you wish to pre-register click on the link below to open the form. When you have completed all of the details, click on the "Send" button to mail your form to us.

When you visit the surgery for the first time you will be asked to sign the form to confirm that the details are correct. You will be registered when all documents of proof have been seen by the practice should you decide to send the completed form to us via this service. We require 2 proof of Address -any of the following are acceptable: Bank Statement, Council Tax, Telephone Bill, Mobile Phone Contract etc. also photographic evidence by producing

When you register you will also be asked to fill out a medical questionnaire. This is because it can take a considerable time for us to receive your medical records. ## **From Iain Steward MP**

**MILTON KEYNES SOUTH** 

Many residents have shared with me their concerns about the South-East Milton Keynes (SEMK) development consultation, and I would like to take this opportunity to set out my own views.



I view the **SEMK Development Framework** as being premature at this point in time. I am strongly of the view that this work should be paused until further notice in order to resolve significant issues that will affect any development in this area. The reasons for this are as followed:

I am concerned that SEMK will be decided before decisions are made on the Marston Vale section of East West Rail. This consultation will be running until June 2021, but outcomes are unlikely to be determined until 2022. Given that significant issues such as the location of stations, crossing points and service patterns will have a significant impact on an SEMK development, it would be better to align these two projects more closely.

The immediate area is already experiencing significant **new housing developments**, including in Woburn Sands and Wavendon. The impacts on local services and infrastructure have only just started and I would contend that these need to be monitored in real time before another 3,000 houses are built in the area.

Also, there may be significant permanent changes to employment patterns post-Covid; we do not yet know what the permanent mix of home and office working will be and, consequently, the effects of that on transport issues and the styles of housing and open spaces that residents might require in the future. I am not convinced that the density of development which 3,000 homes in the area suggested would deliver is going to be what is required in the future.

For all these reasons and other unstated reasons, I have strongly urged the Milton Keynes Council to pause the SEMK process and allow proper consideration of how new developments can be built in a way which can command local support.

# Testing and vaccinations play a big part in controlling COVID-19.

• Around one in three people who are infected with COVID-19 have no symptoms and could be spreading the disease without knowing it. Regular testing is important to help find more of these cases, so people can isolate and break the chain of transmission.

• COVID-19 vaccines provide really good levels of protection. As well as reducing cases, if vaccinated people catch the virus they are less likely to be seriously ill or die. Please come forward for vaccination when it's your turn and tell your family and friends how important it is to be vaccinated.

### HOW DO I GET MY VACCINATION?

All adults in the UK should be offered their first dose by the end of July. When your age group is called,



you'll receive a text from the national booking service inviting you to make an appointment at a vaccination centre. Pictured is the team at the Saxon Court vaccination centre in Central MK.

You may also receive an invitation from your GP. These don't cancel each other out. Please choose which is most convenient for you and book either through your GP or the national booking system by visiting **nhs.uk/covid-vaccination** or ringing **119**.

### **HOW DO I GET TESTED?**

We're offering **free rapid COVID-19 tests** to anyone over the age of 16 at Central MK Library on Silbury Boulevard. No need to book, show ID or register just ask a member of staff.

You can also visit our Central MK Library for a free on-site test. No need to book. Results will be sent to you within around 45 minutes. The test centre is open weekdays from 9.30am to 4.30pm and stays open later on Thursdays until 7pm.

• To build community spirit so that neighbours can work together for everybody's benefit – to reduce the fear of crime. We encourage you to set up a Closed Group in Facebook for your members

• To report suspicious incidents in your neighbourhood to the Police and know how to report them

• To look at improving the neighbourhood, (fixing street lighting, potholes, overgrown bushes etc)

### **BENEFITS**

• NHW signage and stickers act as a deterrent

• Receipt of Thames Valley Alert messages informing you about burglaries and crime trends taking place in your area. These messages can also include Witness Appeals, information about/from our policing teams and Thames Valley Police press releases

 Most insurers offer a discount if you are a member of a NHW scheme

• Crime reduction and policing information given at the setup meeting including leaflets and street signs and roundel stickers for your windows.

### **NEXT STEP**

• Each scheme has a coordinator who acts as the key contact point for the scheme. They liaise with the police, scheme members

• The first step is to speak to your neighbours and find out if they are also interested.

• Not everyone in a street or Neighbourhood needs to join a scheme for it to work. It will work as long as there are enough residents to keep an eye out for each other's properties and to liaise with the police

# The Joys And Hazards Of The Great Outdoors

As summer approaches and we keep our fingers crossed for some good weather, many people will be hoping to make the most of the great outdoors.

Whether you are camping, exploring or having a barbecue, Buckinghamshire Fire & Rescue Service has put together some top tips to help make sure you have a safe and enjoyable time.

Community safety manager Joanne Cook said: "It's natural to want to go outdoors and enjoy the warmer weather with family and friends.

Many people wait to get the barbecue lit, and we all know how tempting it can be to give stubborn coals a helping hand - but please be patient and make sure you use the right tools for the job.

Never use petrol or other flammable liquids to get the barbecue going. Prepare well in advance and light the charcoal early.

"And if you've planned a barbecue and the weather lets you down, don't take the barbecue indoors or into a tent. Nationally, in recent years, a number of people people have sadly succumbed to carbon monoxide poisoning as a result, so we are urging everyone to stay safe this summer."



- Never leave a lit barbecue unattended.
- Follow the safety instructions provided with disposable barbecues.
- Never use a barbecue indoors.
- Make sure your barbecue is well away from sheds, fences, trees, shrubs or garden waste.

- Keep children, pets and garden games away from the cooking area.
- After cooking, make sure the barbecue is cool before moving it.
- Use enough charcoal to cover the base of the barbecue, but not more.
- Empty ashes on to bare garden soil, not into dustbins or wheelie bins. If they're hot, they can melt the plastic and cause a fire.
- Enjoy yourself, but don't drink too much alcohol if you are in charge of the barbecue.
- Always keep a bucket of water, sand or a garden hose nearby for emergencies.

















Never throw cigarette ends out of car windows - they could start a fire and ruin the surrounding countryside.

Avoid open fires in the countryside, and don't leave bottles or glass in woodlands – they can catch the sunlight and start a fire.

Don't smoke or use candles inside a tent Don't take a barbecue into your tent - the into your tent - th carbon monoxide could kill you.

Make sure you Make sure your barbecue is away from trees, shrubs, sheds, fences or garden waste. Never leave it unattended.

Never store gas cylinders under the stairs. If there is a fire, they might explode and block your escape route.

Store gas cylinders outside, away from direct sunlight and frost. Change them outdoors or in a well-ventilated area

Turn off gas canisters when not in use. Make sure all joints are tightened, safe and secure.



Allow at least six metres between tents and caravans and ensure they are away from parked cars to reduce the risk of fire spreading.

- Don't smoke inside tents.
- Never use candles in or near a tent torches are safer.

 Keep cooking appliances away from the tent walls, and never cook inside a small tent or near flammable materials or long grass.

> Make sure you know how to escape by cutting your way out of the tent if there's a fire.

 Make sure everyone knows how to put out clothing that's on fire - STOP, DROP AND ROLL

#### **OPEN FIRES:**



IF YOU MUST HAVE AN OPEN FIRE OUTDOORS:

- It should be downwind, at least 10m from the tent.
- Clear dry vegetation, such as leaves and twigs and form a circle of earth around the fire.
- Build a stack that will collapse inwards while burning.
- Do not leave fires unattended.
- Make sure that fires are fully extinguished after use.
- Make sure you have the land-owner's permission.

### CARAVANS:

OP

- Fit and test a smoke alarm in your caravan.
- Take special care when cooking don't leave pans unattended.
- Turn off all appliances before you go out or to bed.

Make sure ashtrays are made of a material that can't burn or and position them securely so they can't topple over
never smoke in bed.

- Don't dry clothes over the stove.
- Remove any litter and rubbish near the caravan to reduce the risk of fire spreading.
- Make sure the caravan is ventilated, and never block air vents, to avoid a build-up of carbon monoxide.



### **GENERAL OUTDOOR FIRE SAFETY:**

• Grass and forest fires spread rapidly, so please don't drop cigarette ends on the ground or throw them out of a car window - they could start a fire and ruin surrounding countryside.

• Don't leave bottles or glass in woodlands as sunlight shining through glass can start a fire. Take them home or put them in a waste or recycling bin.

• If a fire should break out, call **999** and give the exact location. If necessary, give a map reference. If this is not possible, a landmark such as a farm or pub will help the emergency services locate you.

• If you discover a fire, don't be tempted to investigate. Leave the area as quickly as possible and call **999**. Do not return unless firefighters tell you it is safe to do so.

### WALKING

The Greensand Country Landscape Partnership has developed new walks to help you explore. The Flit Valley is a rare gem and a self-guided walk



follows the River Flit through its quiet valley rich in history and wildlife. This route introduces you to some of the wonder to be found along the Flit, from peat bogs and ancient woodland to the stories told by historic buildings and archaeological finds.

You will soon be able to experience the extended and improved 40-mile-long Greensand Ridge walk with new leaflets and signage. Gateway features designed with the help of the community, will soon appear in Leighton Buzzard and in Gamlingay and mark the new beginning and end of this well-known trail.

Three new routes, the Ouzel Valley Meander, Weneslawe and Katherine Walks, will start from new housing estates, leading people from their new homes to take in the views, soak up the landscape and enjoy the physical health and mental wellbeing benefits associated with exploring the great outdoors.

These walks lead to local cafes and will help new residents explore the history, heritage and rich culture of Greensand Country.

### CYCLING

Cycling is popular in Greensand Country, where quiet lanes and ever-changing scenery make for great days out by bike. There are plenty of level stretches for leisurely



rides, as well as challenging climbs for seasoned cyclists and a network of off-road routes that remain passable year-round, thanks to the area's sandy soil.



In partnership with Sustrans and Central Bedfordshire Council, seven new circular cycling routes have been created to help you to explore more of Greensand Country by bike. Some of these are for families. The Greensand cycle ride will now extend for more than 40 miles from Leighton Buzzard to Gamlingay and has new signage and downloadable leaflets to help you find your way and learn

about the natural and cultural heritage of the landscape.

### **HORSE RIDING**

Horse riding in Greensand Country is a fun way to explore the landscape and the sandy



soil of Greensand Country makes it the perfect place for hacking along greenways and bridleways – many of which are dry and mud-free even in winter.

Getting out and about in Greensand Country has never been easier, with 5 new circular horse riding routes promoted by the British Horse Society and the Greensand Country Landscape Partnership for all abilities which are available from our website.

There are parking places for your horse box and places for you and your horse to stay too. Riders wishing to venture 'off the beaten track' of public bridleways can purchase a Greensand Horse Riding Pass.

### **TRAIN AND BUS**

If you prefer to explore via public transport rather than on foot, there is a train and bus network at your service!

Mainline train stations at Leighton Buzzard, Flitwick

and Sandy provide frequent and fast links to Greensand Country from London and the North. As well as inter-city services, the Marston Vale Community Rail Partnership (https://www.marstonvalecommunityrail.org.uk/) offers an hourly train service to the North of Greensand Country, through the beautiful countryside between Bedford and Bletchley.

Regular public and community bus services run throughout Greensand Country, including Door to Door (https://bedsrcc.org.uk/what-we-do/communitytransport/road/door-to-door/), Wheels in Motion and Greensand Country Transport (https://bedsrcc.org.uk/ what-we-do/community-transport/road/greensandcountry-community-transport/).
